increasing membership across the state by promoting an increase of 2% or more and provide support to chapters to robustly recruit.


I will coordinate with the Communications/Marketing Committee to provide marketing strategies that chapters can use to attract new members including college students and reach out to former members.

Minutes of the May 8, 2023 Meeting (Wilson County Public Library)

Omicron Meetings

President Christine Gilmore welcomed the Delta Kappa Gamma members at 5:30 PM at the Wilson County Public Library. Twenty-six members were in attendance. Jean Yelverton gave a wonderful inspiration about" Ways that You Can Tell You Are a Real Teacher" I think we can all associate with many of the things she said. Meredith Fychok then introduced our guests for today -Jennifer Long, Claudia Spenser,

and Emily House.

Beth Searcy then introduced our speaker for the day, Mahalia Witter- Merithew of Casita Brewing Company. Mahalia went to public school here and many of our members taught her. Beth told us a little of her remarkable story before coming back to Wilson, her hometown, in 2017. She taught English as a second language in Korea, and lived and worked in Denmark, England, and New Hampshire. Mahalia is the business manager of the brewery that she and her husband own and operate. They have given over \$60,000 to local nonprofits. In 2021, she was named a Hometown Hero and in 2022 a small Business of the Year.

Mahalia then talked about how Wilson is so different from the Wilson she grew up in. She accented our diversity and our eye on the future. She feels her travel experiences has enabled her to see what Wilson needs to improve on. She has a love, respect, and admiration for teachers who work daily with the future generation. Thank you to Mahalia for all you do to make Wilson a better place.

Marsha Irvin made a correction in the minutes of the February meeting. Our February report should state the beginning balance as of November 3, 2022 was \$6870.75. A motion was then made to approve the February minutes by Rose Bissette. Diane Hooks seconded the motion and the minutes were approved. Marsha then gave the Treasurer's Report. Our beginning balance as of February 27 was \$6470.15. Income was \$40.00 from donations to early teachers. Expenses were -Dress for Success- \$50.00, Charge for new checks-\$68.98, and postage -\$12.60. Our ending balance as of May 8 was \$6,378.57. That is made up of--\$5,022.01 in checking, Westview House-\$54.35, Early Career teachers-\$165.00, and Scholarship Fund-\$1,137.21

Marsha reminded everyone that our dues are due June 1 (\$75.00 and \$12.00) for raffle. They can be paid today or sent to Marsha.

Susie Pope, Corresponding Secretary, sent a card to Tasha Weatherington on the death of her father. Committee Reports:

Carol Putney reported that we gave \$10.00 gift cards to 32 beginning teachers in elementary, middle, and high school.

Convention Report was made. Christine said that we received the Order of the Rose Award and the Communication Award for our Newsletter. Our incoming President 's theme is Recruit, Recognize, and Retain. Christine also said that she went to three sessions on Legislative, Retaining Membership, and Scanning Picture Books. Jean Yelverton said that there were no major rules changes at this time, but there will be a way for us to vote on line in the future. Jean also said next year's convention will be in Durham. Marsha Irvin mentioned that our next turn in the Soup kitchen is July 31 and she will be contacting members about that.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:20 PM.
